I love Advent... the anticipation, the reflection, the peaceful joy that builds through the month. I love it, but I'm not sure I'm good at it.



I don't like waiting. I don't like waiting in traffic. I don't like waiting in line. I don't like waiting for someone else to finish their job so I can do mine. Sometimes I don't even like waiting for someone else to finish a sentence! I like to get things done, check them off the list, and then move on to the next thing.

And I think that's why Advent is so meaningful to me. Advent challenges me to stop and wait. It challenges me to stop "doing" and take

some time to just "be." Advent offers me a chance to light just one candle at a time and to reflect on each one before moving to the next.

It's hard to keep Advent. It's hard because there are cards to send and gifts to buy and halls to deck. It's hard because there's a barage of Christmas parties and family gatherings. It's hard because there are carols to sing and lights to enjoy and cookies to bake.

The trick is to find the Advent peace in the midst of all that. The trick is to decorate the house slowly and mindfully, reflecting

on the beauty of each added element. The trick is to bake the cookies and address the cards as prayers, keeping in mind the people whose hearts will be warmed by them. The trick is to hold on to the



to-do list lightly, choosing peace and reflection over getting it all done.

Even as I write these words, I'm struck by how simple that sounds. But I'm also struck by how unlikely it is that I'll be able accomplish it. I guess that's why each December I need Advent to come again. Perhaps I can keep it just a tiny bit better this year than last. And, given enough years and enough candles, maybe I'll eventually be able to say that I have Advent in my heart.

— From the Bishop -

Advent 2013

Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

O God, you have blessed us with minds to think and hearts to love: Grant us all the courage to seek you, the strength to endure, the wisdom to listen, and the grace to live fully into the gifts you have given us, that we may be transformed in our common life: through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Even before I was consecrated as your bishop in May of 2010. I attended my first LARCUM gathering (Lutheran, Anglican, Roman Catholic, and United Methodist). This ecumenical group, comprised of bishops and their ecumenical officers from each denomination, meets on a regular basis to discuss religious matters that are common to all of us. The five of us - Herman Yoos (ELCA), Charles vonRosenberg (The Episcopal Church in SC), me. Robert Guglielmone (RC) and Jonathan Holston (UM) - all began our ministries as bishops within a narrow time frame and have not only become dialogue partners, but friends. Since the spring of 2012, our dialogue has especially focused on the needs of children and youth in the state of South Carolina, especially with regard to public education.

This dialogue has galvanized and energized us over the past year and a half as we've worked to understand and discern the role of the church in addressing South Carolina's challenges in public education. In response to that work, the LARCUM

Bishops have agreed to, at least, a fiveyear commitment to work together in advocating and increasing the involvement of our local congregations in support of public education.

Some may fairly wonder if our involvement is about pushing religious agendas on an unsuspecting public. There can be no question about our commitment to the faith we hold dear. Indeed, all our judicatories have private religious schools in which our perspectives on faith have an explicit role in education. Some of our children attend these schools. But our collaborative effort with regard to public education is focused on a more basic and general human right - the right to learn - a right that many children across the state of South Carolina, especially those in extreme poverty, are struggling to realize.

Churches have played a powerful role in learning for centuries, and scripture gives us countless examples of the power and necessity of learning, and of the yearning to learn. Psalm 119 is almost a love song to learning. Jesus' slipping away from his parents at age twelve to sit and learn at the feet of rabbis in Jerusalem tells of his love and passion for learning.

As persons of faith, we are constantly in discernment about how God would have us develop and use our particular gifts, not least among them, our minds. And we are called to bring out those gifts that others have. As bishops, our stake in education is a response to Christ's command that we love one another as he loved us. That we

give ourselves to one another as he gave himself for us.

Recently at the 91st Diocesan Convention. many of the congregations in the Episcopal Diocese of Upper South Carolina displayed exhibits of their ministries in support of public education. A survey of our congregations indicates that approximately half of our congregations are actively engaged in initiatives that provide after-school care. tutors, school supplies, weekend meals, summer enrichment programs, community gardens, Christmas gifts, and transportation. In addition, as many of our congregations work through a strategic visioning process of Witness. Common Mission and Service to the World, additional resources are being developed to address the needs of the children and youth in Upper South Carolina.

Our recent LARCUM Bishops' Dialogue, a public event, featured former South Carolina Governor and US Secretary of Education Dick Riley as its keynote speaker. Clergy, school board members, education advocates, teachers, principals, superintendents and interested citizens attended from across the state and across political lines. Governor Nikki Haley has called upon the churches to play a role in the education of all South Carolina children, and our LARCUM work is helping us to identify what the churches can do - there is much - and what only government can do.

In the coming year, we will continue to identify collaborative possibilities across ecumenical lines, especially those collabo-

rations that involve direct, relational connections in tutoring, enrichment and summer learning opportunities for preschool children. We will look for all our congregations to consider ways large and small to participate in these collaborations. We will also be looking for partners in the business community.

Episcopalians in Upper South Carolina already have a powerful witness in this ministry as we support the chidren that have been entrusted to us. It's worth remembering that as John the Baptist proclaimed a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins, his proclamation called the crowds to be just and to share what they had with others (Luke 3). These ministries are thus indicative of the Kingdom of God.

The needs of South Carolina's poorest children are before us. Advent tells us that the Kingdom of God is at hand and calls us to see and hear things we have missed and to turn around - repent is John's word - and to bring that kingdom into being. Here and now.

May God's word, made manifest to us in the person of Jesus Christ, bless and fill you with hope and believing in the power of the Holy Spirit.
